

A Benchmark Year!

Vision To Learn's Maryland program's reached new benchmarks in its seventh year of operations, with a record number of vision screenings, eye exams, and glasses provided to children attending Baltimore City Public Schools. This boost in impact was enabled in large part by adding a second mobile clinic, generously funded by the France-Merrick Foundation. The new clinic allowed our program to increase our capacity to help kids. By the end of the 2022-23 school year Vision To Learn had provided over 3,500 students with eye exams and 3,100 kids with glasses, in partnership with Baltimore City Health Department, Johns Hopkins University, and Warby Parker. This marked a 52% increase in the number of eye exams conducted and a 78% increase in the number of kids receiving glasses when compared to the 2021-22 school year.

Vision To Learn's most productive year continued into the summer. Baltimore City Public School students who did not pass the year's school-based vision screening were able to make an appointment to get their eyes examined by Vision To Learn at their local Boys & Girls Club, library or other participating programs.

After Vision To Learn provided Raquel a pair of glasses, her handwriting improved, she began coloring inside the lines, and she had no trouble reading. It turns out that Raquel wasn't actually autistic, she just couldn't see! Now Raquel is able to fully participate in class and by the end of the year she was able to catch up academically to the rest of her classmates.
